Read, Write, Count aims to build parents' confidence, and encourage families to include easy and fun reading, writing and counting activities in their everyday lives. Mrs O'Neill and Mrs Burke have invited Primary 2 and 3 parents into school to find out about the Read, Write, Count bags that the children will be bringing home.

We'll also be starting some lunch time 'Wee Bookworms Book Clubs' for pupils who would like to meet to share a book, discussing what they have read at expressing their opinions, likes, dislikes, etc.

This month we will be having Talk Money Week which runs from the 7th - 11th November when we will be having a focus on Financial Education.

The skills, knowledge, attitudes and behaviours that help people to manage money and achieve good financial well-being begin to develop from an early age. Money and Pensions Service (MaPS) research shows that financial behaviour starts to be shaped between the ages of three and seven, with parents and carers being a key influence, and long-term financial outcomes can be predicted from skills and behaviour in children as young as five.

Evidence suggests that children are most receptive to learning about money at points where it relates to events in their real lives, at 'teachable moments' and 'just in time' for their learning to be applied. Opportunities for learning might spring from something in the news, something that has happened in a child's life (e.g. getting money from the tooth fairy, getting a new pet) or just an inquisitive question (e.g. How does money get in a cash machine? Who invented money? Why do children receive different amounts of pocket money?).

Please share any learning experiences you have with your child via their SeeSaw journal and we will be sharing our school learning with you throughout this week.
